At Holy Nativity, we believe that learning is most effective when it is meaningful, engaging, and balanced with time for reflection, rest, and personal growth. It was no surprise that our 2023-2024 Shield Yearbook was dedicated to retiring school chaplain, Steve Bates. At the reveal, Coach Laura Grissett prepared a great slideshow of photos and videos with quotes from current students.

Father Steve was hired as the rector of Holy Nativity Episcopal Church in 2006 and took on the role of chaplain at HNES in 2009. Judy Hughes wrote the poignant yearbook dedication and included these words, "Father Steve has made so many permanent contributions to HNES and his relaxed and non-judgmental essence have been the guiding light for that welcoming feeling for all who enter the doors of Holy Nativity Episcopal School. The Blessing of the Pets, introduced by Fr Steve, is now probably the most anticipated and loved activity of the school. The special student writings he presents at 8th grade graduation are life affirming; his talks at each graduation ceremony are witty as well as inspiring: his ways of making memorable points in weekly chapels have become legendary: and his middle school religion classes are everyone's favorite class. Fr Steve also introduced an important short course to the middle school curriculum. God's Gift of Sexuality. He has attended HNES field trips and even held a communion service in a NYC hotel during an 8th grade trip. And, of course, there is the Father Steve benediction loved by all.

It is hard to imagine going through the years of Hurricane-Michael-recovery-and-rebuilding and continuing into the years of Covid-shut-down-and-restarting without our rock, Father Steve.

It is important that we remember Father Steve Bates' full time job is, and was during these back-to-back disasters, Holy Nativity Episcopal Church. The church had serious hurricane damage with church families individually facing the after-effects of the Cat 5 storm. This was followed by the Covid fears and uncertainty and, once again, figuring out where or how to gather as a church family. Father Steve somehow managed to be there day after day for both his church and his school.

It was because of Fr Steve providing the church location that HNES was the first school in Bay County to open after the hurricane. He grilled food, found tables and

chairs, offered every available space, and spoke encouragingly to everyone through it all.

During a worldwide pandemic that brought all of us navigating uncertainty in our own ways, Fr. Steve remained a steady voice of love and hope. Never missing a moment to remind us that we are all God's hands placed on this Earth to do goodwill and shine his light. As the school also went through a change in leadership between Mrs. Judy Hughes retiring and Mrs. Cynthia Fuller stepping up to the plate during these COVID times, he was there to support in whatever way needed to ensure that Holy Nativity continued to thrive with God's love at the center of every decision made for our families. Even after all of that, Lori Bates summed up Steve's answer to his calling saying, "I believe Steve is doing what he was called to do for sure! God

has a plan for us all and our entire family has been blessed by this journey. God and the church have provided us with great happiness and love." Lori added, 'There has never been a dull moment and I suspect it will not start now.'

How true her words are! Lori reports that immediate retirement plans for Father Steve will begin with a June 2024 family reunion (that started with 9 people the year they were married and is now up to 30 people); a sabbatical trip up the east coast, a visit to National Parks and seeing that part of the country; a trip in August to Greece, Turkey and Croatia to add to their previous travels to the Holy Land, Italy, Portugal and Spain; and then plans to enroll in culinary school in the fall of 2024. Wow! "





Page 6 HNES "Chaplain Emeritus" Fr. Tom Gives Last HNEC Message - An Ode to His HNES Days

Our Bible readings about love encourage me to tell you my most exciting adventure in ministry. Twenty years ago, I was chaplain at Holy Nativity Episcopal School. It was the highlight of my life. I'll not speak for Fr Steve, but he might say the same, and I pray it will be so for Fr Forbes, that he'll be happy here, that he'll love us, feel our love for him, and stay many years. At Holy Nativity School, the chaplain is also religion teacher, and at first, I was anxious about teaching children, remembering how bored I was with religious instruction as a boy. I'd taught graduate courses in political science as adjunct professor at university, and I'd taught freshman college courses in OT and NT to high school seniors, but I had no experience teaching children: HNES students are 3-4-5-year-old pre-kindergarten through 13year-old middle schoolers, and the prospect of boring them terrified me! At HNES, I led chapel three times every Wednesday - - (kindergarten, lower school, middle school chapel). My classroom task was religion teacher for I decided early that my Theme would be the NT Greek word AGAPE, which is love that is not a feeling but how we treat other people - - people who are different from us; people we do not know; people we avoid, are suspicious of, look down on, fear, even hate. It's human nature that we stick together, separating from others by race, religion, social status, ethnic background, outlook, values. But in AGAPE, Jesus calls us to overcome human nature and BECOME more like God. The student body at Holy Nativity School is mixed - - several Christian denominations from Christian, Jew. Muslim, Hindu families, A racial mix of White, Brown and Black; not to mention girls and boys in class together at a Time of budding and bursting adolescence, bravado, fear, insecurity. Single-parent homes, traditional two-parent homes, blended families, wealthy families, poor families, average families. Anyway, my Theme: Love God Love Neighbor, centering on the NT Greek word AGAPE. In chapel I'd encourage students to call out what AGAPE meant to them, and they'd shout KINDNESS, PATIENCE, THOUGHTFULNESS, GENEROSITY, CONSIDERATION, ACCEPTANCE, HOSPITALITY, FORBEARANCE, - the King James Bible beautifully translates into "lovingkindness." AGAPE was my sole message my years as chaplain and religion teacher, and as Head of School, Beverly McDaniel helped emphasize it all the years we were working together. There were charming moments introducing "LOVE GOD, LOVE YOUR NEIGHBOR", opening the school year at our first kindergarten chapel in the Fall, Beverly asked the room-full of 3, 4, and 5-year-olds, "WHAT ARE OUR TWO RULES?" Tiny hands went up all over the room. Beverly pointed to a hand and a child shouted, "NO BITING." Beverly affirmed the rule NO BITING, while clarifying that the rule she had in mind was LOVE GOD. Then she asked, "And what's our second rule?" From somewhere in the middle of the room a little child shouted, "DON'T THROW SAND." Little children understand concrete thought, NO BITING, DON'T THROW SAND; they are not into abstract notions like LOVE GOD, LOVE NEIGHBOR, but it Becoming chaplain and religion teacher. I was anxious comes in Time. about middle schoolers being bored and dreading my classes. But as it happened, at just the right moment, TIME MAGAZINE published a front cover article titled, "How to work with 13-year-olds" - - and TIME magazine's first recommendation was bring snacks. Linda baked cookies, cupcakes and brownies, we cut apple slices, carrot sticks, we stuffed celery with cream cheese; I made weekly runs to the Cove Shopping Center grocery store for cookies, candy, fruit and vegetables, juice, milk, soda, ice-cream-on-a-stick. I frequented Krispy Kreme on 23rd Street, and Dan-D-Donuts on Harrison Avenue across from Bay High School. Later, after I retired from the school, I was told that a new rule had been made: NO FOOD. It was just as well I was no longer there, because I make my own rules and my first rule is "THERE ARE NO RULES." I may have had the most eagerly anticipated religion class in town! One morning I stuck my head in Amy Moody's math classroom to ask her a question and a student shouted, "Father Tom! What's for snacks today?" But what about religion, teaching religion, that was my job?! Well, the snacks were about experiencing AGAPE (and I made sure the students knew that), but before starting that first school-year, I conferred with a person who had a masters degree in middle school education: she



suggested the idea that basing my classes on Modern Fantasy Fiction. So, I picked Christian Fiction. In religion class we read books and watched films of CS Lewis' CHRONICLES OF NARNIA, that Lewis originally wrote for children, and he described as "Christian preevangelical." It took discussion, and orientation toward theological reflection, but EPIPHANY came when students could see Jesus on the Cross when Aslan the Lion voluntarily gives up his life to savage execution by evil monsters in order to save the boy Edmund, who'd fallen for the Wicked Witch, eaten her enchanted food, swallowed her lies, and betrayed his loved ones. And I remember the classroom reaction of stunned realization when the stone table cracks as Aslan breaks free from death and returns in love and power: students crying "OH! YEAH!" as they suddenly see Easter Dawn. The Sacrifice of Calvary, the Empty Tomb, the post-Resurrection appearances are AGAPE, that's our religion, that's the Gospel! Watching a movie or reading a book, whenever we spotted something that was AGAPE in a story, we paused to identify and discuss it. Starting class every week, I invited students to be observant and share anything they wanted to tell us about AGAPE that they'd noticed outside of school - - at home, in the family or with friends. I told them: the idea is always to be aware of AGAPE in life. semester exam in December 2005. Beverly and I took the entire middle school, 75 students, to a local theater for the premiere showing of the Hollywood extravaganza, CS Lewis' Narnia film "THE LION, THE WITCH, AND THE WARDROBE": watch the movie, come to class the next day to discuss the film, compare it to the book; compare the wild Hollywood version to BBC's quaint old DVD movie that we'd watched in class; and get an A for the semester: that was AGAPE too! My next year as religion teacher we did the same thing, but with JRR TOLKIEN's THE HOBBIT and LORD OF THE RINGS books and movies. My third year the same plan - - with HARRY POTTER books and movies by author JK Rowling, a Christian Doubter - - her stories are ripe for spotting AGAPE. and we did that together in religion class. I made sure parents knew what we were doing, so they could intervene if they didn't want their child involved. My middle school students are now in their thirties. "Some have died who deserved life" - - I'm thinking of Richard Youd, and Ryan Yessman - - my deepest grief in life was preaching their funerals. - - For the others, I have no idea whether what we did has stuck, but I love them dearly. I'll bless them as long as life endures, because AGAPE, nothing matters but Love; and that's the gospel of the Lord.










Holy Nativity Family is Saddened by the Loss of our Own "Mr. Paul"

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



It's been a fantastic year for our Robo-Bolts Robotics team! Thanks to the support of Coach Jeremy Branon, our one veteran member (Alexandra) and six rookie members, we started the year with a lot of learning. Our members learned about building and coding. They tested various robot designs and worked to develop a strategy to complete as many missions as possible on this year's challenge course. The theme for this year is Submerged! In addition to competing in Robot Games, the team also had to develop an Innovation Project related to the theme. Our research and Table Talks led to an innovative solution for Diver's Panic: The SSS-Serene Seas Suit! Diver's Panic impacts more than half of recreational divers and accounts for approximately 20% of diver deaths. The SSS is an augmented diving suit that includes several modifications to help divers avoid or reduce panic. The Robo-Bolts accrued an impressive list of successes during the season. At the first competition, they had the highest score in Robot Games, were awarded a second place award for their Innovation Project, and earned the prestigious Champion's Award for the highest overall score at the event! At the Regional Championship, the team won third place in the Innovation Project category and earned a bid to compete at the State Championship. The State Championship took place at SeaWorld. Out of more than 800 Florida teams competing in the FIRST Lego League Challenge division, only 88 were invited to this

event. Thirty teams were recognized with awards, and the Robo-Bolts were one of these teams! The Robo-Bolts were finalists for the Innovation Project Award at this event. Congratulations, Robo-Bolts, on another stellar season!


